SCHOOL

Noor-Ul-Iman School is a non-public, non-profit, tax-exempt educational organization recognized by the New Jersey Department of Education and accredited by the New Jersey Association of Independent Schools. It is located in the suburban community of South Brunswick about midway between New York City and Philadelphia. Noor-Ul-Iman School is currently in its thirty-first year of operation. The current enrollment is 613 students in pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade. There are 129 students in ninth through twelfth grade. This year there are twenty-eight students enrolled in the twelfth grade, who will be the twenty-second high school graduating class.

Noor-Ul-Iman School is a college preparatory school that strives to give students the knowledge and skills they will need to succeed in college and move on to the careers of their choice. Noor-Ul-Iman School has a 100% college attendance rate post-graduation, with students applying to colleges within the United States and abroad ranging from state colleges to the Ivy League.

The classroom facilities for pre-kindergarten through twelfth grade students are located in a contemporarily designed school building which opened to students in two phases, in September 2012 and September 2014. In addition to classroom facilities, library, biology/chemistry lab, and physics lab. All classrooms from Pre-K 3 through twelfth grade are equipped with interactive whiteboards. Students are provided with school issued chromebooks, providing additional computer access to students beyond the computer lab. NUI is looking forward to building Phase III of the permanent school structure, which will provide a cafetorium, a gymnasium, and special-purpose classrooms. The 2024/2025 operating budget is over 7.7 million dollars for the entire school. The school is governed by a Board of Directors consisting of a group of professionals from diverse fields. The administrative and educational affairs of the school are managed by the Head of School with the help of an administrative team consisting of a group of professional educators averaging eighteen years of educational experience, and a Business Manager with thirty plus years of experience in the field.

The Noor-Ul-Iman student body is very diverse. Students come from a variety of cultural and economic backgrounds. The current student body consists of approximately: 67% Asian-American (Indian, Pakistani, Bangladeshi, Sri Lankans, Chinese, Japanese, etc.), 24.5% White (European and Middle Eastern), 1.5% African-American, 3% Hispanic, and 4% multiracial. The majority of the students are bilingual, and some are trilingual. This diversity of the Noor-Ul-Iman student body gives the students a greater perspective on cultural traditions as well as religious understanding.

FACULTY

The 129 high school students are instructed by twenty-six full time and part time teachers allowing for the advantages of a low student-teacher ratio. In addition to the high school teachers who have Bachelor's degrees in their fields, twelve have Master's degrees and three have PhD's. All of the world language teachers are native speakers of the language they teach. High school teachers have a median of eight years of teaching experience and many have additional experience working in industry in their respective fields. Some high school teachers have published papers and/or books and many have led workshops in their areas of expertise.

Past Graduates: Noor-Ul-Iman School has graduated 419 students in the last twenty-one years, including ten National Merit Finalists and fifty-nine National Merit Commended Students. The average SAT scores for the fourteen years of graduates through June 2017 are 623 for verbal and 648 for math. The average writing score for the twelve years through June 2017 is 644. Past graduates have also been accepted to special honors programs such as the honors combined seven year B.S. and DMD degree program and the honors combined six year B.S. and Pharm D. program.

CURRICULUM

The majority of courses are year-long and worth one credit. Enrichment classes are awarded credit hours based on how often the classes meet. Physical Education is a year-long course worth 0.4 credits.

Courses are designated on the transcript as (H) for Honors, based on the level of the textbook and the critical thinking required. Students are placed into Honors classes based on the previous year's academic performance including standardized tests. All core curriculum courses on the transcript are college preparatory. In addition, Noor-Ul-Iman School offers five AP courses, AP Calculus BC, AP English Language and Composition, AP Literature and Composition, AP Biology and AP Chemistry. At this time, we also have twelve courses that have been approved for dual credit with Middlesex County Community College.

High School Program at Princeton University: The program is designed to serve exceptional high school students who have demonstrated consistently superior performance in all aspects of their academic work and shown a sincere interest in pursuing study at truly advanced levels beyond those offered by their respective high schools.

Middlesex County College High School Scholars Program: The High School Scholars Program is a dual enrollment program which provides eligible students the opportunity to earn Middlesex County College credit through their regularly-scheduled courses taken at Noor-Ul-Iman. Noor-Ul-Iman High School currently has twelve approved courses eligible for college credit.

AP Online Courses: In addition to our in-house AP courses, students may qualify to take online AP courses.

Senior Project: Seniors choose a topic/field of their choice, and research it through either vigorous inquiry into the proposed topic and creating a thesis, or through a work-study or internship program, followed by a report detailing his/her experience. This culminates in an independent project that polishes skills of reading, writing, research, evaluation, and communication.

Community Service: Noor-Ul-Iman School requires students to complete at least 100 hours of community service by the end of their senior year.
